Disguised basal cell carcinomas: how to track them down with reflectance confocal microscopy.

ABSTRACT

Basal cell carcinoma (BCC) is the most frequent form of skin cancer. The diagnosis generally relies on clinical and dermoscopic appearance1 . The typical dermoscopic algorithm for the diagnosis of BCC includes: erosion or ulceration, maple leaf-like areas, blue-gray globules, ovoid nests, spoke wheel-like areas, brown dots and arborizing vessels2 .
